"Since 1971, Heller has worked with some of the world's finest designers. Heller products are beautiful and timeless. Used by leading architects for museums, offices, and restaurants as well as homes."

For over 50 years, Heller has provided leading designers with a platform to exploit new technologies in the design of cutting-edge products and research into innovative manufacturing processes.

Founded in 1971 in New York, the company launched its first product, a line of stackable tableware designed by Massimo Vignelli. Awarded a Compasso d'Oro in Italy, **MAX** is now part of the permanent collection of the Museum of Modern Art in New York. The collection, reissued in 2023, is now available once more.

In 1998, Heller marked the start of its foray into the world of furniture with a real masterstroke: The Bellini Chair, a creation by Mario Bellini, also awarded the prestigious Compasso d'Oro in 2001.

Since then, Heller's success has been built on fruitful partnerships with renowned designers such as Massimo & Lella Vignelli, Philippe Starck, Vico Magistretti, William Sawaya, Frank Gehry and Studio 65.

And that's just the beginning! In its quest for innovation and style, Heller also collaborates with young talent, the designers of tomorrow who are destined to redefine the design landscape. One such collaboration is **SWELL**, the fruit of a partnership begun in 2022 with the talented Anna Dawson.

In 2024, to celebrate the 30th anniversary of **EXCALIBUR**, Heller and Starck are reissuing the iconic toilet brush in 4 new colors, 100% recyclable, in 100% recycled polypropylene for an intelligent, functional and sustainable design.

In 2025, Heller continues its commitment to materials with Worry Free Plastics and unveils two new products: a reissue of the Asti ice bucket (1972), updated in 100% recycled ABS, and the Swell Mini™ by Anna Dawson, a compact version of Swell, a wall-mounted catchall/hook that blends sculptural design with everyday function.





Stackable, colourful and fun, when you look at this elegant tableware, you can't help but smile.



On February 16, 1995, the New York Home Section ran the headline: "High design for a humble object". Philippe Starck had teamed up with Heller to satisfy a long-held desire, and the result was front-page news.

"I always thought this would be the apotheosis of my career, because designing a toilet brush is the humblest service I can render. We worked very seriously with a vision, with humility and whimsy, and created a useful and timeless product that, thirty years later, continues to proudly serve its purpose with elegance and playfulness. The new reissue of Excalibur honors the original, timeless design of the toilet brush, which remains part of the permanent collection of renowned art museums such as MoMA and the Philadelphia Museum of Art. However, the new version of Excalibur has been thoughtfully edited with sustainability in mind, as it is now made from 100% post-consumer recycled (PCR) polypropylene.

ASTI Ice Bucket

The Heller ice bucket, designed in 1972 by Italian architect Sergio Asti, is a classic of minimalist design. Its elegant cylindrical shape, glossy exterior, and integrated handle embody the balance between aesthetics and functionality.

Displayed at the MoMA and in international exhibitions, it has become an iconic object. In 2025, Heller is reissuing it using sustainable materials made from recycled plastics, thereby extending its legacy while addressing contemporary challenges.




As of April 1, 2025, Heller is partnering with **Worry Free Plastics** to transform the composition of its iconic furniture and certain accessories into a 100% regenerative material, thanks to a patented enzymatic technology. This cutting-edge process, combined with Heller's ethic — creating icons made to last — raises an essential question: can an object designed to stand the test of time leave no trace? The answer: yes.

About Worry Free Plastics

Worry Free Plastics is a patented enzymatic technology integrated into the material during manufacturing. It remains dormant throughout the product's useful life, preserving performance and durability, and activates only at the end of life—in environments such as landfills, industrial composting, soil, or marine settings, where it is consumed by naturally occurring microorganisms.

The material thus returns to nature within a few years rather than centuries, without leaving microplastics, with performance and claims validated by independent tests according to ASTM methods.





THE VIGNELLI DUO

Lella and Massimo Vignelli were an iconic duo who revolutionised the world of graphic design and brought a new approach to creating designs that were both visually stunning and functional.

Throughout their illustrious careers, they left an indelible mark on the design industry with their minimalist aesthetic and innovative use of typography.



Influential designers Lella and Massimo Vignelli have promoted clarity and coherence in numerous projects. A product of the Castiglione architects in Milan, Massimo absorbed Adolf Loos' principle of global design, from the spoon to the city. Lella, who came from a family of architects, shared this vision. Their book "Design is One" underlines the unity of design with principles of semantic accuracy, syntactic coherence and timelessness. Their careers, particularly their stay in the United States from 1957 to 1960, gave concrete form to their mission of "Better design for a better world". They founded the American branch of Unimark International in 1965, designing distinctive corporate identities for companies such as American Airlines, Ford, Knoll International, and the New York City and Washington DC transport authorities.

Throughout their long careers, Lella and Massimo Vignelli have collaborated, making the most of their different talents, working both together and separately. Massimo was renowned for his ability to perceive possibilities, while Lella excelled in concrete realisation. Their creations can be found in the permanent collections of many prestigious international museums, including MoMA, the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Cooper-Hewitt Museum. They have received countless awards, Massimo being the winner of most of the world's major graphic design distinctions, while Lella has been honoured for her outstanding achievements in the field of interior architecture. In 2003, they were honoured with the National Design Lifetime Achievement Award



ANNA DAWSON

Anna Dawson, an accomplished designer and artist based in Brooklyn, New York, finds her inspiration in the effortless fluidity and buoyancy of surfing, a passion born out of her struggles and ultimate love for the sport. Born in Sausalito, California, to architect parents, she learned to see the world through the prism of art and design. Her childhood, a balanced mix of creativity and outdoor exploration, instilled a curiosity that continues to influence her work.


An alumna of Whitman College and the Rhode Island School of Design, Anna honed her skills in photography and furniture design, resulting in a unique style that tells a story of resilience, discovery and a love of nature. PHILIPPE STARCK

This world-renowned designer, with over 10,000 works to his credit, is a tireless advocate of ethical, political and subversive design. For Starck, design is about improving people's lives, not just creating objects or spaces. This philosophy makes him a central figure of "democratic design", aiming to make innovative, high-quality design accessible to all.

Starck, known for his understanding of contemporary change and his innovative imagination, is constantly pushing back the boundaries of design. His creations, ranging from furniture and juicers to revolutionary yachts, space modules, electric bikes and solar boats, embody the idea of being "good" before being beautiful. His works, tinged with humor and creativity, dialogue with society to inspire and engage. Starck advocates positive degrowth and solutions that respect the human and environmental future. His work in technology, such as smart thermostats and wind turbines, demonstrates his commitment to a democratic ecology, putting innovation at the service of society and the environment. He anticipates convergence and dematerialization, creating objects that maximize utility and intelligence.





SERGIO ASTI

A designer who has always been linked to industry. A refined formal research and a skilful use of materials characterize his career, Sergio Asti, after graduating in Architecture at the Polytechnic University of Milan, is active in the furnishing sectors of residential and commercial spaces. And in the study of object design: his creations include lighting fixtures such as the Scafandro table lamp for Martinelli Luce in 1972 or the Daruma glass table lamp by FontanaArte; ceramic products such as the vases of the Toky collection by Superego Edition of 1980; and in crystal such as the set of Mapan glasses in collaboration with the Arnolfo glassware of Cambio, . He is one of the founders of ADI, (Industrial Design Association 1956) of which he is currently an Honorary Member. Assistant at the Polytechnic University of Milan from 1953 to 1958, he taught courses in various Italian, Portuguese, Japanese and American universities. Winner of the Compasso d'Oro award in 1962 with the flower vase of the Macro series for Salviati & C., he received a gold and a silver medal at the XI Triennale. His works are exhibited in several important museums including the London Design Museum (1989), the MoMA in New York (2005), the Philadelphia Museum (2008).

ALAN HELLER

Alan Heller was an American designer and entrepreneur known for his innovative and functional furniture.

He founded Heller Inc. in 1971, which quickly became known for its production of high-quality modern furniture. Heller's designs emphasise simplicity, durability and user-friendliness, and have won numerous awards for their innovation and aesthetic appeal.

Collaborations with leading designers such as Mario Bellini, Frank Gehry and Massimo Vignelli have produced some of the most iconic furniture of the 20th century.

Heller's commitment to quality and innovative design made him a respected figure in the furniture industry. He died in 2021 at the age of 81.

The Heller initiative now thrives under new leadership. A design-focused team, previously instrumental in shaping the influential Design Within Reach stores in the USA is now in charge. The legacy of founder Alan Heller lives on, as the company continues to push the boundaries of contemporary design culture.
