For more than 10 years, **MAY - Maylis et Charles Tassin** has been distinguished by its bold, opulent, neo-classical approach to décor and furniture. The company has a rich family heritage linked to the history of art, weaving together different eras and drawing inspiration from the styles of the 40s and 70s. Its objects are poetic, sensual, sometimes mysterious and always timeless, blending harmoniously with the architecture of yesterday and tomorrow. Particular attention is paid to the design, with every curve and counter-curve carefully studied to achieve perfect balance.

This quest for perfection translates into rigour, filtered through the artistic prism of Maylis and Charles. The result is exceptional pieces that combine **ancestral savoir-faire with a contemporary approach**.

When **Maylis and Charles** imagine their decors, they seek to set themselves apart from contemporary trends by showcasing their own creations, enriched by unusual objects and singular antiques that they unearth from around the world.

Charles, who comes from a family of antique dealers and designers, became an interior architect and designed a large number of bespoke pieces of furniture for his various projects. Maylis, a visual artist, has turned to the decorative arts and works with craftspeople to create her installations.

Their meeting goes beyond a simple love story; it's a perfect match, a total affinity of tastes and a shared vision of the designer's work. Their four-hands creates decors and collections that strike a balance between the masculine and the feminine, rigour and madness, the structural and the organic.

Ten years ago, Charles and Maylis set up shop in the heart of the Carré des Antiquaires, at 23 rue de Lille. They soon expanded to 34 rue de Lille, where their collection is now on display by appointment. Their creations, true antiques of the future, perpetuate the French art of living, fitting elegantly into refined interiors in France and abroad.

Architects, designers and creators of exceptional furniture, Charles and Maylis Tassin have been commissioned to create private homes in the Yvelines, a Provençal house in the Middle East, the Alexandre Vauthier fashion house, a Parisian restaurant, and several Parisian flats for fashion celebrities.

Their next confidential project is the complete overhaul of a private mansion, which will be unveiled at the end of the year.



Edgar, the son of Maylis and Charles, wanted to participate in the creation of the collection.

This sketch fits perfectly with the medieval inspiration that is very present in their latest creations.

They chose to produce it in plaster, thus reviving the aesthetic of the 1940s, which itself was often influenced by the world of chivalry.

For us, a chandelier must be sculptural, spectacular and yet timeless. Nature is a vast source of inspiration in the history of art. Ellsworth Kelly's « Plants » series was the inspiration for Maylis' design. She wanted a lunar finish, in white gold ionised cast aluminium. ELLSS is conceived as an imaginary bouquet, a hybrid of several memories drawn from her own.

CORBB DINING CHAIR

The CORBB chair embraces a distinct neoclassical aesthetic, directly inspired by the structured elegance of Louis XIII furniture.
